North Dakota librarians and public library board members recently had the opportunity to attend the second-annual Summer Breeze Colloquium workshops, which were hosted by the North Dakota State Library. The workshops were August 7-8 in Bismarck, and featured several core topics of library management.

On the first day, attendees learned about library policies. State Library Field Services representatives and workshop attendees considered the issues and challenges behind good library policies and worked on drafting effective policies. In addition, attendees collaborated for the creation of brand new model policies for core library practices, like circulation, internet access provisions, and material selection.

New News and Thoughts...

It is almost time for a new school year to begin. This event, for adults, youth, and children, prompts many memories. For me, the season brings memories of the NBC-TV show of the 1950s called “Ding Dong School” which was hosted by Miss Frances. On each show, she started with a loud ringing of her school bell and then immediately began her teachings of the day which included beginning math, vocabulary enrichment, and crafts. Indeed, “Ding Dong School” was a highlight probably exceeded only by the “Kukla, Fran and Ollie” show, also on NBC-TV, which featured a favorite puppet named “Colonel Crackie” who was a Southern gentleman.

So, as the summer months draw to a close, it is time for many to begin making preparations for a new school season to be filled with new challenges and learning experiences. Children may have apprehension about new teachers and new subjects; youth may wonder how they can juggle their respective curriculum and part-time work at a local commercial establishment or on the family farm/ranch. Teachers, like their students, have concerns about new texts, the number of students in a class, and the responsiveness of the students to the education process. The common hope of all, however, is for a successful year of learning and accomplishment.

To aid this quest for success, the North Dakota State Library provides **TutorND** which is a program of learning that gives tutorial aid to students, age kindergarten to adult. The tutors interact with the students using a white board technique that allows for conversation in a format similar to the instant-messenger style. The tutors provide aid in the subject areas of social studies, English, science, and math. Each tutorial session may last up to 20 minutes; if the student needs additional help, additional time may be obtained with an additional log-in.

The great thing about **TutorND** is in the ability of the program to help make a difference in an individual’s learning and accomplishment and, importantly, in their self-esteem. The tutorial aid provided can, obviously, help any student to pass any class and achieve those minimum standards that are required. But the great and wonderful thing that **TutorND** can do is to take the accomplished student and make them an exceptional student. Indeed, the tutorial assistance provided has often proved to be the difference between the “B+” student and the “A” student. Can you guess which student gets the scholarship dollars when they choose to go to college? Can you guess which student becomes the manager of the farm/ranch? Can you guess which student becomes the owner of a business?

TutorND is accessible to learners from almost any location in North Dakota between the hours of 6:00 to 10:00 PM (Central time), Sunday through Thursday - at the local public library; in school buildings; on the college campus; and, from the home of any citizen. As with the other databases provided by the North Dakota State Library, learners need only a local library card to facilitate a log-in at www.tutorND.com. **TutorND** is a no fee service of the North Dakota State Library, which makes the challenge to all the citizens of North Dakota to try **TutorND**. We think it will make a difference in your life because “knowledge is the fuel of success.” It is now your turn to move to the head of the class!

"Dark Night, Sleepy Night," "Dr. Seuss's Sleep Book" and "Night Monkey, Day Monkey" were read during storytime. The stuffed animals stayed overnight and were picked up the following morning.

RDA FOR THE SEASONED CATALOGER: PRINT MONOGRAPHS (SELF-PACED WORKSHOP)

As goes the Library of Congress, so go many other libraries. This may well be the case come March 31, 2013, when LC moves to using RDA for all of their original cataloging needs. In anticipation of this transition, Minitex is offering to experienced copy catalogers and original catalogers the following 3-part, self-paced workshop on cataloging books and other print monographs using the new standard in the MARC environment.

RDA FOR THE SEASONED CATALOGER: AUDIOVISUAL MATERIALS (SELF-PACED WORKSHOP)

As with other formats, audiovisual cataloging will continue to carry on many AACR2 practices under RDA, but will see some changes too. North Dakota Sights and Scenes : World's Tallest Salesman Exhibit

Although his official height is a source of some controversy, Clifford Thompson was undoubtedly a very tall man. Thompson, born near Rugby, North Dakota, in 1904, claimed to be 8'7" tall and weigh 460 pounds.

Thompson earned his teaching certificate; performed in the circus; worked as a traveling salesman for milk, shoes, and Blatz beer; worked on his family's dairy farm; and acted in a few Hollywood movies. Later in life, he earned his law degree and practiced law until his death from cancer in 1955.

At various times he was billed "The Scandinavian Giant," "The Wisconsin Paul Bunyan," "The Norwegian Viking Giant," and "Count Olaf," but the Clifford Thompson exhibit in Rugby refers to him simply as the "World's Tallest Salesman." The exhibit features a full-size 8'7" mannequin of Mr. Thompson and an outline of his size 22 shoes. According to RoadsideAmerica.com, when asked the question, "Why was Cliff so tall?" the exhibit curator replied, "That's what happens when you feed a Norwegian boy enough."

This spring the Grand Forks Public Library took on the adventure of creating a garden for children. The project allows local children to become growers; growing not only vegetables, but growing enthusiasm for learning about nutrition, gardening, and caring for the environment. The library built four raised beds for vegetables and purchased seeds, gardening tools, and soil.

Children in kindergarten through 7th grade meet weekly to tend the garden and participate in gardening lessons. During the summer, children have learned about composting from a local extension agent, taste-tested new fruits and vegetables, and discovered how good soil creates healthy plants. Later this summer, children are looking forward to a Farmer's Market field trip, harvesting their vegetables, and participating in "Kids in the Kitchen," a cooking class using vegetables from the garden.

2012 Theodore Roosevelt Symposium

“Theodore Roosevelt: The Progressive in the Arena” is the title of the 2012 Theodore Roosevelt Symposium to be held September 20-22, 2012, at Dickinson State University. Speakers for the event will include Kathleen Dalton, author of *Theodore Roosevelt: A Strenuous Life*; Nancy Unger, author of *Fighting Bob La Follette: The Righteous Reformer*; Jeffrey Ostler, author of *Prairie Populism: The Fate of Agrarian Radicalism in Kansas, Nebraska, and Iowa, 1880-1892*; as well as Professor Mark Harvey from North Dakota State University, Professor Kimberly Porter from the University of North Dakota, and Professor Frank Varney from Dickinson State University.

The symposium will try to place Roosevelt in the larger context of progressivism and the progressive movement. Speakers and attendees will also explore Roosevelt’s relationship with the various threads of prairie discontentment between 1880 and 1919, including North Dakota’s Nonpartisan League.

Digital Preservation in a Box

The latest project from the National Digital Stewardship Alliance, Outreach Working Group, has now reached a milestone with the public unveiling of a new resource, “Digital Preservation in a Box.” The “Box” is a virtual one and is essentially an online collection of resources for the learning and teaching of digital preservation – collected, organized and accessible through one place.

A basic rundown of the “Box” contents includes:

- Digital Preservation 101 – introductory materials, including videos, articles, and tutorials explaining the concepts involved in digital preservation;
- Glossary – collection of glossaries from various institutions and programs, containing explanations of relevant terms;
- Preservation by Format – where to find information for specific digital formats including photographs, audio, video, email, etc.;
- Digital Preservation Tools – basic tools listed for either “consumer” or “information professional;”
- Digital Storage – some options geared towards personal archiving or the basic knowledge needed to understand preservation storage technology;
- Resources for Educators – curriculum guidance and teaching materials;
- Marketing and Outreach – links to marketing materials that can be adapted to support specific events;
- Event Guidance – what you need to know to prepare a digital preservation event at your institution; and,
- Brief Introduction to Digitization – all about scanning, and making the distinction between digital preservation and digitization.
