Non-Native English-Speaking Patrons

Anyone who has ever attempted to learn another language—whether they found success or failure—knows that doing so can prove difficult. For example, think of how many native English speakers struggle with grammar, meanings of idioms, and exceptions to “rules.” (I think of how many words do not follow the “i before e, except after c” rule).

While the United States does not have an official language, the standard expectation is that residents of this country can communicate in English. (Several states do have official languages, typically reflecting the vernaculars most frequently spoken in their region.) Well, the landscape is changing. More and more individuals and families come to live in the United States, hoping for better opportunities. It is not unrealistic for even small-town libraries to possess non-native English-speaking patrons with varying levels of English proficiency. In fact, in the 2007 Analysis of Library Demographics, Services, and Programs, ALA found that libraries that serve communities of 100,000 or less possess the highest percentages of non-native speakers as patrons (n.d.).

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Notice of Upcoming OverDrive Server Maintenance

ND School for the Deaf Collection Expansion

A few years ago, the State Library (NDSL) formed a digital collection partnership with its sister agency, the School for the Deaf (NDS). The Digital Initiatives Department at NDSL focused on digitizing the school’s newsletters and making them publicly available on Digital Horizons. The Banner, the official newsletter of NDS, was first published in 1891, and it is still published today. This digital collection was called the ‘North Dakota School for the Deaf Banner.’

Several months ago, NDSL and NDS decided to expand their collection partnership. The school has such a rich history, dating back to the 1890s, that it seemed appropriate to include more than just newsletters.

The expansion is not yet complete, but several updates have already been made. First and foremost, the name of the collection was changed. ‘Banner’ was dropped from the title to reflect a broader name: the ‘North Dakota School for the Deaf’ collection.

This week, I will examine two other conference topics: Lightbox e-books and other tech resources.

Lightbox E-books

Lightbox offers interactive e-books for grades K-12. These e-books include exterior web links, PDFs for students and teachers to print, Google Maps, quizzes, videos, audio recordings, and curriculum information. Additionally, Lightbox can be linked to other curated resource collections. Thirteen different subscriptions are available, including grade band nonfiction, elementary Spanish, primary elementary world languages, primary elementary guided reading, and elementary Accelerated Reader. Lightbox works with a variety of automation systems, including Follett Destiny, MackinVIA, Mandarin, Alexandria, Opal, and D2L.

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North Dakota State Surplus Property

North Dakota State Surplus Property is a way for state government agencies to redistribute, recycle, and re-utilize federal and state property by transferring surplus property to eligible entities. In addition to disposing of unsalable property in a safe, responsible manner and recycling electronic waste, State Surplus sells excess state property to the public. For acquiring federal property, you must be one of the following: political subdivision, educational facilities, healthcare, qualifying nonprofits, SBA 89 (a) contractors, veteran-owned small business, or a state agency.

Oftentimes, office furniture, file cabinets, and other items can be purchased from State Surplus with little wear for a good price. The warehouse in Bismarck is located at 1278 Hemlock Street and is open Monday through Friday, 8:00 AM – 4:00 PM.

WASHINGTON -U.S. Government Publishing Office (GPO) Director Hugh Nathaniel Halpern announces the appointment of five new members to the Depository Library Council (DLC). DLC members advise the GPO Director on policy matters relating to the Federal Depository Library Program (FDLP) and access to U.S. Government information.

Grand Forks Public Library Director Wendy Wendt said social service hours are new to the library as the library started providing this service at the beginning of the month.

"We were looking at ways that we could better serve the community and help connect the community, which is part of our mission, to resources that they might need," Wendt said. "Some libraries have full-time social workers in big cities and we knew we couldn't do that, but we were looking at how can we scale that down for a community of our size that we could offer some assistance."

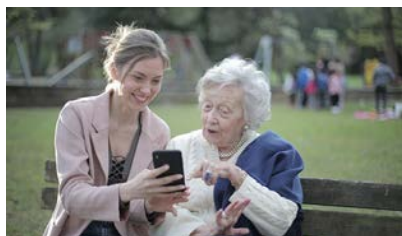
