NEW EASY WAY TO ACCESS MULTIPLE BOOKS ON CARTRIDGE!

NLS recently released an important revision to the software that controls the Digital Talking Book Machine. The much-anticipated update will enable users to sequentially play multiple books on a cartridge without having to use the Bookshelf feature.

A growing number of NLS network libraries are distributing cartridges with more than one book on them. If you subscribe to more than one audio magazine, you already may be receiving cartridges that contain multiple titles.

Most users love the convenience of having several books or magazines on a single cartridge, but not everyone is comfortable using the Talking Book Machine's "Bookshelf" feature to navigate among titles. If you're one of those people, then the new sequential-play feature may be just the thing!

With the Easy Method, the player will announce "End of book, press Play/Stop to go to the next book." Tap the play button to go to the next book or magazine. The updated software is included on all cartridges that contain multiple books or magazines and installs itself automatically when a cartridge is inserted into the Talking Book Machine. No action is required on the part of the user.

The new feature makes it easy to play multiple books in sequence just by pressing a single button. For those users who want more flexibility, the standard Bookshelf mode will still work as before, allowing users to play multiple books in any order they wish.

ORDERING BOOKS FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Patrons may find that book delivery is slower during the holiday season due to the increased volume of mail the postal service handles this time of year. Please note that the Talking Book Library will be closed December 24th and 25th. Because of the extended weekend, we encourage our patrons to order extra books in advance so they will have plenty of reading material on hand.

BREATH SWITCH HARDWARE NOW AVAILABLE

For patrons unable to use the buttons on a digital talking book machine NLS now has a breath switch adaptor. The switch attaches to the machine through the USB port next to the headphone jack. Using a combination of short and long sips and puffs of air, the breath switch provides control of all functions of the digital player except power on and off.

BARD EXPRESS

BARD Express, a Windows-based application for those who download from BARD using a PC, is available from the National Library Service (NLS).

BARD Express simplifies the process of downloading and transferring audio materials to a cartridge or USB flash drive. The major advantage is that BARD Express unzips and transfers the files to a cartridge for you with the click of a button.

If you are a BARD user and want to start using BARD Express, you must first download the software to your computer. It is available on the BARD main page under "Additional Links, BARD Express." Some FAQs, a User's Guide and some helpful screenshots are also available within this BARD Express link.

If you are not a current BARD user and want to start, you will first need to apply for BARD by calling the Talking Book Library at 1-800-843-9948 or emailing tbooks@nd.gov and giving us your email address.

After logging in with your password, you will not need to login again for up to one year.

Several short NLS produced YouTube videos are available for further help with BARD Express at https://youtube.com/. Search for BARD Express.

BARD Express will manage BARD materials downloaded to a PC and categorize them by books, magazines, read items, and unread items for easy sorting. It also provides device management options from the main menu for customizing the process.

BARD Express is designed for use on Windows personal computers running XP, Vista, 7, 8, 8.1, or 10. BARD Express is not for use on mobile devices or Macintosh computers.

ORDERING BOOKS

Our patrons often have a long list of new books they want to read after receiving the latest issue of Talking Book Topics. You can either mail the order form, email the book numbers or call the library with your order; however, if you are requesting books by using the title or author name, we are now limiting your request to 6 books per call, so that reader advisors have time to assist as many patrons as possible during business hours.

NEWSWEEK READERS

Newsweek will no longer be available effective October 31, 2018. American Printing House has discontinued this service for this magazine. We do not know if it will be available in the future, but we are hoping that may change because many of our patrons enjoy this publication.

ENHANCED SECURITY FOR YOUR BARD ACCOUNT

If you haven't used your Braille & Audio Reading Download (BARD) account for one year or more, the library will automatically mark your BARD account as "Inactive/Suspended," which will prevent you from logging into BARD. If you find you are unable to login to BARD, please contact us, and we can quickly and easily reactivate your BARD account. To prevent this from happening to your account, you must download a book or magazine from BARD at least once per year.

WHERE ARE MY BOOKS?

If you ever feel like you are not receiving all your books, the following are some reasons why this may happen.

- You have reached the limit of books allowed. Remember books in transit still count as being checked out to you.
- You have read all the books written by your favorite authors.
- You are set up as "request only" and have not given us new titles to add to your account.
- Your desired reading interest preferences are too limited.
- You have exhausted your reading interest list, and there are no longer any books available to add to your request list.

ARE YOU ACTIVE?

Individual readers are considered active in the Talking Book program if they borrow or download at least one book from our library during a twelve month period, or if they have an active subscription to a magazine. If you have not checked out a book or magazine recently, please contact us before your account becomes inactive.

CARTRIDGES NOW AVAILABLE FOR PATRONS TO DOWNLOAD BOOKS

The Talking Book Library will now be able to loan patrons one cartridge and a cartridge cable to download books from BARD. If interested, please call the library at 1-800-843-9948 or email at tbooks@nd.gov.

RETURN OF EQUIPMENT

When returning digital player machines for any reason, please use the box and the repair sheet that came with the player. On the repair sheet or on a piece of paper, please let us know if you need a replacement player or are suspending your service with the Talking Book program. If returning a machine for a relative who is deceased, please write deceased on the repair sheet as we do not usually know otherwise. This action will allow us to avoid unnecessary phone calls regarding the reason for the return of the equipment.
