On December 23, 1994, the United Nations General Assembly signed a resolution stating that every August 9 would be celebrated as International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples worldwide. This day commemorates the first meeting, which was held in 1992, of the UN Working Group on Indigenous Populations.

The 2024 theme is: Protecting the rights of Indigenous Peoples in Voluntary Isolation and Initial Contact. There are an estimated 200 Indigenous groups who have chosen to remain isolated from the rest of the world. 



# "Devolution" by Max Brooks **Reviewed by Paul Ebach**

The acclaimed author of "The Zombie Survival Guide" and "World War Z" returns for a new horror outing, this time starring not an army of the undead, but a group of Sasquatches. Set in the fictional tech commune of Greenloop, nestled at the foot of Mt. Rainier, the story is told from the pages of the diary of Kate Holland, a member of the commune who has since gone missing. When Rainier erupts, cutting Greenloop off from the rest of the world, the small community find DEVOLUTION themselves at the mercy of the mountain's true inhabitants.



If the book has one problem, it is tone. Brooks seems to want to walk a fine line between the camp of "The Zombie Survival Guide" and the more serious found footage horror of "World War Z" and I feel like he never truly finds his footing. The book also indulges a bit too much in the usual lost-in-the-woods cliches, like characters panicking over a clattering in the darkness only for somebody to say, "It's just a raccoon," when it's clearly anything but a raccoon. As a lover of horror cliches, this did not bother me too much, but somebody with a more discerning pallet may find them hard to swallow.

The good news is that, once the book's giant, hairy antagonists show themselves, the book really gets going. The Sasquatch attacks are satisfyingly fun and gory, enough so that I'm willing to forgive the book's slow start. I'm still on the hunt for a truly terrifying Bigfoot story, but until I find it, "Devolution" is a perfectly fine stop on that journey.


#### **Climate Literacy Kit: Adults**

Climate Literacy Kits are now available for check out. With four age categories - Grades K-2, Grades 3-5, Teens, and Adults - each kit includes everything needed to conduct a full program.

The Adult Climate Literacy Program in a Box Kit includes six lesson plans about climate, ecology, sustainable living, climate change, carbon footprints, and renewable energy sources for adult learners. There are also eight craft project ideas designed to reduce, reuse, and recycle (craft project supplies are not included in this kit). Each kit includes one book and one DVD.

This project was made possible thanks to the North Dakota Department of Emergency Services through the Emergency Management Performance Grant from the Department of Homeland Security Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the Institute of Museum and Library Services, and the North Dakota State Library.





#### August is National Civility Month

Incivility has been found nearly everywhere – social media, airplanes, concerts, and other public spaces. The workplace should be immune to incivility, but, unfortunately, it was found that about 1 in 4 employees have experienced behavior that is rude, disrespectful, or aggressive, according to a MeQuilibrium survey. Ethisphere's 2023 ethical culture report saw workplace bullying has jumped from 20.1% to 33%.



In August, we recognize how important civil behavior is in our communities while celebrating National Civility Month. First established by the International Institute for Civil Leadership in 2014, it is "a way to spread awareness about the need for good manners, respect, and consideration for others."

Provides more than 270 topics, each with an overview, point, counterpoint, and Critical Thinking Guide.



## "The Moth and the Mountain" by Ed Caesar

In the 1930s, as official government expeditions set their sights on conquering Mount Everest, a little-known World War I veteran named Maurice Wilson conceives his own crazy, beautiful plan: he will fly a plane from England to Everest, crash-land on its lower slopes, then become the first person to reach its summit-- all utterly alone. Wilson doesn't know how to climb. He barely knows how to fly. But he has the right plane, the right equipment, and a deep yearning to achieve his goal. In 1933, he takes off from London in a Gipsy Moth biplane with his course set for the highest mountain on earth. Wilson's elevenmonth journey to Everest is wild: full of twists, turns, and daring.



Eventually, in disguise, he sneaks into Tibet. His icy ordeal is just beginning.
