Children of Incarcerated Individuals and Books

In February 2023, Casey Family Programs reported that according to the U.S. Department of Justice, approximately 1.8 million individuals were incarcerated in state, federal, or local facilities in 2020. These incarcerations included parents or guardians of an estimated 4.9 million children. What impact do such incarcerations have on children? Can books play a role in helping children cope with and understand feelings and events surrounding the imprisonment of a parent or guardian? The following titles are examples of books that might make a difference for children who have or have had an incarcerated parent or guardian. Published in 2017, Far Apart, Close in Heart: Being a Family When a Loved One Is Incarcerated by Becky Birtha is a picture book for ages 4-8. Kirkus Reviews describes the book as "A racially and ethnically diverse sampling of children who exemplify the grief and discomfort that come with losing a parent to incarceration" and "...this book is a necessary one" (2017).





Make Your Plan to Vote

MAKE YOUR PLAN TO VOTE

The November 5 General Election is getting close, and the ND Secretary of State encourages you to make your plan to vote -It's as easy as 1-2-3!

1. Make sure you have valid identification

- · You must provide a North Dakota driver's license, North Dakota non-driver ID card. Tribal ID or letter, or long-term care certificate to vote in North Dakota elections.
- · If you've recently moved or have outdated information on your ND driver's license or ND non-driver ID card, make sure you update it before you vote.
- You can update your address with NDDOT using their online system, by calling 701-328-4353, or by making an appointment to visit a ND driver's license site.
- · If you update your ID through the NDDOT online system, you won't receive a new license or card, but your voter record will be updated to reflect the correct address.

2. Choose how to cast your ballot

- You have three options for voting: 1. Absentee, 2. In person on election day, 3. In person early voting (if offered by your county).
- · If you plan to vote absentee, submit an application for a ballot as soon as possible to your county auditor. If you submitted an absentee ballot application for the June Primary Election, you could choose which elections you wanted to receive an absentee ballot for this calendar year. If you indicated that you want to receive a ballot for the November General Election, one will be sent to you. Absentee ballots must be postmarked by November 4 or dropped off to your county auditor by 5:00 p.m. on November 4
- · If you plan to vote in person on election day or during early voting, you can find your polling location information based on your address at vote.nd.gov.

3. View a sample ballot to prepare

- You can view a sample ballot based on your address at vote.nd.gov to see the races and measures you will be voting on and make notes, which can be brought with you to the polling location.
- · If you want to learn more about the statewide measures appearing on the ballot, you can find information on the $\underline{\text{Measures on Ballot}}$ page on the ND Secretary of State




