Proving a Library's Value & Role in Academic Institutions

In his 5 Laws of Library Science, S. R. Ranganathan describes the library as a "growing organism," which "means that a library should be a continually changing institution" (Librarianship, 2019). Budget cuts, short staffing, or new technologies may force a library to make changes. However, academic libraries also find themselves needing to adjust to prove their value and role in higher education systems.

Some stakeholders in academic institutions need to see the value of the library or notice its role in the education process. When this happens, the library may find funding or physical space removed and utilized by another academic division. In a 2018 study that surveyed provosts and chief academic officers on their perceptions of academic libraries and their value, 72 percent of the participants favored supporting a library budget if data and student academic success could be linked to library services and resources. It is imperative that academic libraries demonstrate their value and maintain a functional role in student success and retention as budget cuts continue to occur in academic institutions (Mullins & Boyd-Byrnes, 2024).

This day commemorates the first meeting, which was held in 1992, of the UN Working Group on Indigenous Populations.

The 2024 theme is: Protecting the rights of Indigenous Peoples in Voluntary Isolation and Initial Contact. There are an estimated 200 Indigenous groups who have chosen to remain isolated from the rest of the world. 

Climate Literacy Kits are now available for check out. With four age categories – Grades K-2, Grades 3-5, Teens, and Adults – each kit includes everything needed to conduct a full program.

The Adult Climate Literacy Program in a Box Kit includes six lesson plans about climate, ecology, sustainable living, climate change, carbon footprints, and renewable energy sources for adult learners. There are also eight craft project ideas designed to reduce, reuse, and recycle (craft project supplies are not included in this kit). Each kit includes one book and one DVD.
