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Library Vision Strategic Plan

The Library Vision Strategic Plan (LVSP) guides the awarding of Library Vision grants. The grants are awarded by the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council and the State Library. The first LVSP was created by a working group that was formed in 1995. The original two versions of the document were adopted for eight years. Beginning in 2014, the time frames for the document began to be shortened. The last plan update was adopted in 2020.

The State Library is pleased to present the newly revised <u>Library Vision Strategic Plan</u> to the library community. We are seeking feedback on the new format of the document. The <u>survey</u> on the revised plan will be open until October 18, 2024. The goals for the Library Vision program have been updated and the objectives have been removed. We felt that would make it easier for libraries to submit grant applications. Once the document has been finalized, the grant application for the Library Vision program will be updated. Grant rounds will now be based on a specific LV goal rather than themed grants as we have offered in the past. Libraries will need to clearly articulate how their grant project aligns with whichever goal is being utilized for that grant round. Applications will be updated to reflect this change.

We invited you take a few minutes to review the draft of the LVSP and to provide feedback to NDSL and the NDLCC on the new goals and the new format.



Online Library Resources Remote Access Dos and Don'ts

Some of the online library resources (databases) that the North Dakota State Library provides access to may require a remote access barcode for use outside of the library building. This barcode may be shared with your patrons or students internally at your library, but you must not publish it in any resources external to your library, like your website or social media accounts.

You are allowed to share this access code in more limited fashions such as bookmarks, posters, or print-only newsletters. This barcode is separate from the one you may use when requesting materials at the State Library. The remote access barcode starts with 23125... The State Library barcode for requesting materials starts with 23105.... Do not give this one out. If you need your remote access barcode number, please contact the State Library's Information Desk at statelib@nd.gov or 800-472-2104, and we will provide it to you.

Library Coordinating Council Nominations Sought

The North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) has a vacancy for an atlarge librarian. The seat must be filled by someone working in a North Dakota library. The person appointed to the seat will serve for the remainder of the term until June 30, 2026.

The NDLCC serves as the State Library's advisory board. The NDLCC assists with the creation and implementation of the Library Vision strategic plan, including the Library Vision grants. The Governor appoints NDLCC members according to Century Code 54-24.4. Typically, the Council meets quarterly with two meetings held in-person and two via videoconference. The in-person meetings also include tours of libraries.

Nominations, including self-nominations, may be sent to the NDSL Administrative email at nds.gov by September 30. The State Library will compile the list of applicants and forward it to the Governor's office. Nominees will also need to complete the Governor's board application, which can be found at https://apps.nd.gov/gov/boards/Application/PersonalInfo.


WordPress Websites Q&A Session

Addict's Wake: Virtual Film Screening & Panel Discussion Webinar

Following a week of virtual film screenings beginning September 19th at 8:00 AM and ending September 26th at 12:00 PM, a panel discussion including the film's director, Lisa Hall, Dr. William Cooke, a community physician and author of Canary in the Coal Mine, and Dr. Lynn Anne Witty will present a one-hour webinar discussion. They will share their experiences and knowledge for recognizing, diagnosing, and supporting persons with substance use disorders while advocating for advances in prevention and recovery awareness and information for the broad impact of substance-use primarily in small and rural communities. The program also will raise awareness of the National Library of Medicine (NLM), the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and SAMSHA information resources.
