### Is There a Knowledge Gap About AI in Schools?

If you are a parent, grandparent, or someone who has Gen Alpha or Gen Z individuals in your life, you may be wondering what impact Al has or may have on their education. A survey by <u>Samsung Solve for Tomorrow</u> sheds light on this topic.

While 88 percent of the parents surveyed believe that AI will be critical in their child's future education and career, 81 percent either don't or are unsure whether learning about AI is part of the curriculum. The article by eSchool News states that such a high percentage of parents not knowing whether their child is learning about AI shows the need for more parental involvement in AI discussions and increased use of AI in K-12 education.

### **Grand Forks City Directories**

The "Grand Forks City Directories" collection features the earliest city directories of Grand Forks, North Dakota. The volumes list the residents, businesses, and organizations present in the city during the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

City directories are a valuable resource for establishing the whereabouts of an individual at a certain place and time. They can provide additional biographical information, such as a person's place of residence,



occupation, place of employment, and marital status. Information regarding local civic organizations and the city's elected officials is also typically listed. A separate alphabetical listing of local businesses by trade, much like a yellow page directory, is also included in each volume.

### **PLA Public Library Staff Survey**

Happy mid-October! Last week, I got an update from the Public Library Association (PLA) regarding progress of their annual survey. We currently have an 11.4% completion rate (just behind the top spot who is at 12.4%). Thank you to those who have already taken the time to fill out the survey. There is still time if you haven't been able to work on this yet. This survey is voluntary, but the data is useful for libraries all over the country. Please consider filling it out. Below is a message from PLA regarding the survey.

The <u>2024 Public Library Staff Survey</u> fielded by the Public Library Association is now open. Questions on this year's annual survey explore staff roles and representation, hiring and retention practices, and goals and activities aimed at creating a welcoming environment for staff and community members in libraries nationwide. Similar questions were asked on the <u>2021 Staff Survey</u> – the baseline year for this topic – so that we can see now in 2024 how the field has evolved. The survey updates information for beginning librarian and library director salaries – data points PLA has been collecting nationally since 2002 – and also includes a special section on accessibility of library facilities and services.

All public libraries are invited to participate in PLA's annual surveys. Log into your library's *free* Benchmark account to complete the survey. One person should submit the survey on behalf of their library – often that's the library director, administrator, or data coordinator. Libraries that complete this year's survey will be entered into a drawing to win group registration for a <u>live</u> or <u>on-demand</u> fee-based PLA webinar in 2025 (up to a \$237 value).

The survey closes **Saturday**, **December 14**, **2024**. Take a few minutes to contribute to the national conversation about library staff roles, representation, and retention, as well as the current state of accessibility in library facilities.
