According to a study by The News Literacy Project, ninety-four percent of over 1,000 young people aged 13-18 stated they would like more media literacy instruction in their schools. In comparison, only thirty-nine percent said they received such instructions. Are your students receiving media literacy instruction?



In a society where most young people get news from social media, it becomes imperative that they learn media literacy skills that enable them to analyze information and sources, evaluate the content source, and engage with various perspectives. Have you ever seen the movie <u>Desk Set</u>? Katharine Hepburn, reference librarian extraordinaire, works to prove her worth against EMERAC, the new electronic brain being used to ease the burden of (or perhaps replace!) the hardworking reference librarians. Spencer Tracy plays the romantic lead who coincidentally is the brain behind EMERAC. The pivotal scene involves a type quick wits, and a librarian knowing where to find the answer.



In the time of Desk Set, reference librarians were necessary because information wasn't easily accessible, and patrons relied on the librarians to answer questions quickly and correctly. Reference workers are just as necessary now for the opposite reason. Patrons have access to so much information that it is easier to ask for help to find reliable sources than to sift through the options on their own.

Reference work can be intimidating, but I encourage you to not back away from the challenge. Your patrons do not expect you to know the answer to every question off the top of your head. Much like in Desk Set, you only need to know where to look. This is a skill that is honed through experience. Every interaction (both inside and outside the library) is preparing you to answer the next question.
