
The Homework Help Postcards have been updated!

Books That Encourage Digital Citizenship

A 2023 Scholastic News Room article states that there has been a significant increase in children using screens while reading frequency decreases. Less youth label themselves as "frequent" readers and read less as they age. While this information is familiar to most, using books to teach online best practices might be less familiar.

A May 2024 Common Sense Education article lists 11 books focusing on digital life topics. The list includes fiction and nonfiction titles for each grade level so that conversations can occur with even the youngest student. A Common Sense Media account may be needed to access the lessons in the book information.



A little note: Some of these individuals are not technically serial killers. To qualify as a serial killer, one must murder at least three people over an extended time, with cooling off periods in-between the killings. However, some of these cases I found interesting enough to include anyway!

1. Redhanded: An Exploration of Criminals, Cannibals, Cults, and What Makes a Killer Tick by Suruthi Bala and Hannah Maguire

Publish Date: 2021 Publisher: Running Press

Summary: Join the hosts of *Redhanded* the podcast—Suruthi Bala and Hannah Maguire—as they explain the science behind why people kill. Topics include biological factors, childhood abuse and neglect, motivations for killing, how insanity ties into killing sprees, incels, cult connections, couples as killers, minorities as victims, and why people are obsessed with serial killers!



Bala and Maguire infuse a great deal of wit into their writing, and back their stances with multiple examples throughout history and from around the world. Additionally, there are various sidebars to better explain vocabulary.

Public Libraries Survey Acronym Dictionary

One thing is for sure, library land loves a good acronym, and the Public Libraries Survey and the systems surrounding it are full of them. It can be easy to throw the acronyms around, but do we really know what they mean? Read on for a quick reference for Public Libraries Survey related acronyms.

- AE = Administrative Entity = The library filling out the survey.
- AIR = American Institute of Research = The organization that IMLS contracts with to conduct the Public Libraries Survey.
- CO = Counting Opinions = The platform that the North Dakota State Library uses to distribute the PLS.
- IMLS = Institute of Museum and Library Services = The federal agency that provides grants to libraries and museums, policy development, and research.
- LSWG = Library Statistics Working Group = The group consisting of State Library Chiefs, State Data Coordinators, researchers, AIR staff, and IMLS representatives that helps determine changes to the Public Libraries Survey.
- PLS = Public Libraries Survey = The annual survey conducted to gather public library data for IMLS.
- SDC = State Data Coordinator = State Library employee who administers the Public Libraries Survey and submits the data to IMLS
- SLC = State Library Chief = State Librarian

I hope that this helps you navigate the seas of Library Alphabet Soup! Now let's start taking a closer look at the PLS changes. There will be articles regarding deletions, changes, and additions every week leading up to February 1.

Resources to Create Artificial Intelligence Guidelines

As schools approach the halfway mark of the academic year, artificial intelligence likely continues to be a topic of discussion. According to a recent article, AI use in schools varies in states and districts nationwide. Some districts allow teachers to use artificial intelligence, but not the students. Others don't allow AI programs on any school devices. This writing provides links to the North Dakota AI Guidance Framework and offers examples from other states.



The following resources can guide schools and districts as stakeholders to create AI policies and educators implement AI tools in education.

Topics in the <u>North Dakota K-12 Al Guidance Framework</u> include general and teacher resources, Al use by grade level, implementation roadmap, and others.

The <u>North Carolina Department of Public Instruction Al Guidebook</u> is a sixty-three-page in-depth document providing an implementation roadmap, guidance on evaluating Al education tools, Al literacy recommendations by grade span, and much more.

The <u>Colorado Roadmap for Al in K-12 Education</u> is less thorough than the North Carolina guidebook but still offers various resources and guidance on how Al can reshape teaching and learning. The guide lists ways Al can support students and teachers and where the tools fall short.

As of December 4, 2024, 20 state departments of education have Al guidance available for K-12 public schools. Visit <u>Al guidance issued by state departments of education</u> to browse more Al guidance resources.

Jan Stauber-Sherlock Holmes Literacy Grant

Deadline: Ongoing Award: Up to \$1,000

The mission of the Jan Stauber Grants is to provide needed financial assistance to persons and organizations developing literacy programs and other educational experiences that will introduce young people to Sherlock Holmes.

Innovative Reading Grant (Capstone and AASL)

Deadline: February 1, 2025

Award: \$2,500

The AASL Innovative Reading Grant supports the planning and implementation of a unique and innovative program for K-9th learners which motivates and encourages reading, especially with struggling readers. Applicants must be personal members of the American Association of School Librarians (AASL)

Roald Dahl's Miss Honey Social Justice Award (Penguin Young Readers and AASL)

Deadline: February 1, 2025

Award: \$2,000 to the librarian, up to \$1,000 travel and housing reimbursement to attend the AASL Awards Ceremony, and a \$5,000 book donation by Penguin Random House

Roald Dahl's Miss Honey Social Justice Award recognizes and encourages collaboration and partnerships between school librarians and teachers in teaching social justice through joint planning of a program, unit or event. Applicants must be personal members of the American Association of School Librarians (AASL) and be a school librarian who has worked with a teacher to execute a project, event, or program to further social justice using resources of the school library.

<u>Libraries Transform Communities Engagement Grant (American Library Association)</u>

Deadline: February 3, 2025

Award: \$2,000

The Libraries Transform Communities Engagement Grant is an annual grant to recognize, promote, and support innovative and meaningful community engagement efforts in libraries. Community engagement is the process of working collaboratively with community members – be they library patrons, residents, faculty, students, or local organizations – to address issues for the betterment of the community. For the 2024-2025 cycle, libraries are invited to submit applications for a community engagement project that focuses on building neighborhood connections.

Peggy Barber Tribute Grant (American Library Association)

Deadline: February 3, 2025

Award: \$2,500

The Peggy Barber Tribute Grant is an annual grant of the American Library Association (ALA) that recognizes, promotes, and supports meaningful programs in libraries that have limited and/or no access to budgetary support for programming. For the 2024–2025 cycle, libraries are invited to submit applications to support programming related to combatting isolation for older adults.

Stephen T. Riedner Grant for Life Enhancing Library Programs for People Living with Dementia

Deadline: February 21, 2025

Award: \$2,500

The Stephen T. Riedner Grant for Life Enhancing Library Programs for People Living with Dementia presents a citation and a grant of \$2,500 each to two libraries to support the creation of new services and/or new programming to directly serve those living with dementia. Applications that describe only existing services or programming are not eligible for this grant. The founder wishes to encourage institutional commitment to serving this population.

Science Kits for Public Libraries

Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers

The Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers Region 4's Science Kits for Public Libraries Grant program is offering up to \$2,000 in funding to public libraries to establish a circulating science kits collection.

This grant provides funding to establish a circulating science kit collection. Libraries are expected to sustain the circulating science kits for a number of years using library budgeted funding, fundraising, or other means.

Applications are accepted until Thursday, January 3, at 11:59 PM.

This webinar will provide an introduction to Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act, and a general overview of the legal expectations for public libraries to provide access and services to people with a wide range of disabilities, as well as information on other emerging accessibility trends such as language accessibility and religious accommodation.

The presentation is focused on the responsibilities of Trustees in ensuring that their libraries are truly welcoming to all of their communities - now and into the future.
