Because each person views finances differently—based on their unique personality, emotions, and past experiences—financial literacy must go beyond the basics to address the behavioral side of money management.

To help residents of North Dakota, <u>SmartWithMyMoney.nd.gov</u> provides free resources that go beyond traditional financial education. By visiting the site, patrons can create a free account and take a personalized assessment to discover their unique money personality.

Once an assessment is completed, a user receives tailored recommendations to help manage money in ways that align with their individual circumstances. The site also offers access to over 34 courses, a library of more than 120 financial topics, and over 2,800 pieces of content, including articles, videos, tools, and courses.

The North Dakota State Library has distributed brochures to libraries to inform patrons about this valuable resource.

Bismarck State College

In 1939, the Bismarck Junior College was created in response to a need in the community for a local college. The first students entered classes on September 4, 1939, and the college was housed on the third floor of Bismarck High School. There were 107 full- and part-time students and 12 instructors. The Bismarck Junior College (also known as BJC) Library opened as part of the BHS Library and had a collection of 500 books. By the late 1940s, enrollment was increasing with the return of soldiers and the need for a new location became a high priority. Because of this need, a new building was funded through a local mill levy and the college and its library moved to its new home at 900 Boulevard Avenue on the southeast corner of the capitol grounds in 1955. This location was short-lived due to increasing enrollment and in 1961 the library opened its doors in Schafer Hall on a tract of land overlooking the Missouri River that had been donated by Harold Schafer.

In 1968, the Bismarck Junior College Library was moved to its own building on the BJC campus. This building also housed classrooms, English and History faculty offices, a staff lounge, the North Dakota Curriculum Library, the Gannon Gallery (inside the BJC library), and the Learning Skills Center. In 1987, the name of Bismarck Junior College was changed to Bismarck State College (or BSC) as it joined the North Dakota University System. The library remained in this location and was remodeled several times throughout its years. During the summer of 2015, the library moved to a new location on the ground floor of Skogen Hall. Demolition of the previous library building was completed September 29 of that year.
